In the destructive recent storms that swept through our area the other week, we sustained major damage to two trees and some of our porch siding. The first person to show up on the scene to try to help was our friend Lion Al. Where there was a need, there has always been a Lion. We are forever grateful for the love, friendship, generosity and genuine compassion for those who call RHTH their home away from home.

This week, we received news that one of our double lung transplant patients from the Milwaukee area had to be admitted for an unexpected issue. Her family are longtime Wisconsin Lions and always so incredibly supportive of Restoring Hope. Happy to report that she went home the other day and is on the mend, but please know that your support for this house not only serves your community and your districts but also your fellow Lions. I wish you all could personally experience the difference this house makes in so many lives when it is needed the most. As we hugged a dear long-term guest from Appleton shortly after she lost her husband to cancer after several grueling days at the hospital, they were so thankful to the community of support and love provided by the house and so many of our families over the years. When things are at their worst, this house is often at its best. It is a life changing place!

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RHTH Updates – June 2022

- Our occupancy rates have returned to pre-Covid numbers as transplants and hospital restrictions have normalized closer to normal.
- The new Program Director for Transplant at UW Health visited RHTH last week and was so moved by our efforts that she would like to volunteer on a monthly basis. She will also be promoting the house throughout the transplant program and is excited to get more engaged in the fundraising efforts for expansion. This was a truly exciting meeting as our ongoing relationship with UW Hospital is so vital. This house is a perfect complement to a world-class transplant hospital and in the words of the head of transplantation, "the greatest resource for our transplant families!"
- For the moment, UW Hospital is now allowing 2 caregivers per day to visit each family. This is a huge difference in the support of patients and also for our overall guest stays.
- The new UW Health Transplant Clinic is finally scheduled to open in a few months. That project, made possible by a generous donation from Pleasant Rowland has endured many of the increases and significant delays we have feared with our own construction. When finished, it will be such a major improvement for our families and make our work here at RHTH even more critical going forward.
- We have continued to see a record number of guests from the Milwaukee, Kenosha, Racine areas after Froedtert stopped performing some critical types of organ transplants. Had a night this past week with 3 Milwaukee families.
- With Covid precautions in place, we are very proud of the fact that no cases of Covid have ever been traced back to RHTH. This is especially critical given the immune compromised cases we see in transplantation. Covid remains a very serious issue in the transplant community. As such, we maintain similar standards to the hospital for the protection of our high risk guests.
- Lions from several area clubs continue to find ways to support this house from speaking on our behalf, maintenance, opening new doors, donation much needed food and supplies to volunteer work days...it all makes such a huge difference.
- Last year, RHTH raised over 800,000 in funds outside of Lions raised in donations and pledges specifically earmarked for construction from several prominent businesses,

foundations and groups including The Culver's Foundation, an anonymous major donor through the Madison Community Foundation, kidney recipient Pleasant Rowland, Endres Mfg., Springs Industries, and even our own transplant families to name just a handful. Major funding efforts continue with a mix of previous donors and new groups.

- We were overjoyed this week to be contacted by Epic Systems who handles all of the medical software for UW Hospital and so many hospitals throughout the country about the potential for yearly major funding. We look forward to this developing relationship.
- One of our recent transplant families is connected by family to the retired CEO of a major US company. In addition to their family staying here for parts of two months, the wife of the retired CEO made a point to come visit RHTH last week. She was so grateful for the care her loved-one received here and was excited to hear about the future plans for the house. We look forward to connecting further with them.
- Our Board President has connected us with a major donor connected with the University of Wisconsin who was so touched by the stories of our house that he has pledged to get more involved and make a donation.
- Our pause for construction continues until a return to normalcy within the construction industry and supply chain normalizes. With construction delay LCIF requested RHTH return \$75,000 grant earmarked for construction. That money was returned in full on June 22, 2022. More details in enclosed letter.
- The support of generous statewide Lions has amounted to about 1/3 of our operations and 1/3 of our construction funding. Amazing work throughout the state!
- We continue to touch base with our Lions Club Advisory Council on construction progress and fundraising. Regular contact with banking, insurance and our trusted house and construction advisors as well as other out of state transplant houses that are also on hold.
- Our paperwork was just submitted and accepted through WDFI for running a non-profit for the coming year. Certificate received on 6/29/22 is attached.
- We had a kidney-pancreas patient in this week who is nearly totally blind from the effects of Type 1 diabetes. Diabetes is an issue that impacts a huge percentage of our guests including all of our current recipients. Between diabetes education, an increased awareness of pancreas transplantation as an option and the costs of insulin, we all need to continue in our mission to spread the word about these critical health issues.

Dear LCIF Board,

Since opening our doors to transplant families in 2013, we have welcomed transplant families from all parts of Wisconsin, 44 different states and even 8 other countries who have come in search of a second chance at life through the miracle of transplantation at nearby UW Hospital and the adjacent VA Hospital.

Lions Clubs of Wisconsin and beyond have been amongst our most loyal supporters for over a decade now and are a big reason we have become such a life-changing part of the transplant community. One of Lions greatest missions is their fight against diabetes which is something that impacts so many of our guests. UW Hospital is the #1 hospital in the country for pancreas transplantation each year which gives new life to countless type 1 diabetics from all across the country. We see firsthand the incredible difference this makes in the lives of so many diabetics crippled with life-threatening issues. A new pancreas transplant gives hope and a higher quality of life to families like the one we have currently from Missouri. We hope Lions throughout our state and beyond take great pride in knowing RHTH provides a much needed home away from home for a condition that Lions are so passionate about...not to mention every other transplant imaginable. With the loyal support of Lions, this house has become a special oasis of compassion and community and we are forever grateful.

Wherever there has been a need there has always been a Lion. From yard work, painting, fixing steps, putting up a fence, deep cleaning, fundraisers, volunteer support, food for our guests, changing a tire for one of our families, help with our Christmas tree to friendship, love, wisdom and sharing our mission with others...Lions have always been there for this house and our families. Our many great successes over the years have been in large part due to Lions like you.

The timing of our initial LCIF grant occurred right around our opening with dreams of getting started, establishing a foundation of guests, learning the heartbeat of the house and what needed to happen for the future based on that wisdom and ultimately expanding and remodeling upon our historic house to create a strong future home for future generations of transplant families.

Over those years, we have collectively built something very special that we are extremely proud of. The other night, we had dinner with families representing every major transplantable organ all gathered around the table sharing stories from their journey. I wish you could all spend a day here just to see the impact this place has on families in need during some of their most challenging days ever. Raising major funding for expansion has not been easy as you well know especially with all the challenges of Covid. Last year, with the incredible support of kind-hearted donors, we raised \$815,000 towards our construction efforts. It was so uplifting to see people step up during one of the worst pandemic marred years ever because they believed so powerfully in our mission and the direction of this house for the future. We were also extremely blessed to pay off the remainder of our mortgage on the house. It was an invigorating jolt of momentum after covid greatly impacted our guest stays during the months in which the hospital was largely on lock down and not taking any transplant families. To bounce back not only financially like we did but also in terms of guest stay numbers, it really lifted our spirits for life after covid and momentum towards construction.

When the impact of covid was at it's very worst, our wisdom and leadership people in banking, venture capital, business, construction and even other transplant house non-profits we are close with, warned us about what was coming with the ripple effects of the pandemic. In fact, the board and financial experts at Mayo Clinic told Gift of Life Transplant House to stop their building addition immediately as it was simply not wise stewardship of funds from donors with costs increasing exponentially and supply chain issues.

As painful as this is to be writing a letter about giving back an LCIF grant of \$75,000 which was so critical in getting our construction momentum going, we believe for the long-term well-being of this house and our availability for families who need it most that this project must be done smartly and on a timeline that is not rushed given all these circumstances. To juggle outrageous budget increases, supply shortages and potentially shut down a million dollar house that has already been paid for and leave our families with no support while we wait this all out would have been even more heartbreaking for us after all our years of dedicating our lives to this mission.

We are thankful for your patience and motivation to see this through. I can promise you that nobody wants this more than we do. We will work harder than ever to overcome this significant loss and move this project forward to build upon the momentum that has been building from last year.

As a fellow Lion myself, I thank you for your compassion for humanity and love for serving those in need. I am a better person and leader because of my time as a Lion and the incredible people I have met within this organization. I have a great deal of respect for you all and for everything you stand for as Lions. As such, please know that we will honor your request for the return of \$75,000 from the LCIF grant. Thanks for believing in us and our mission. It is heartbreaking to feel as though we have let you all down, but I can promise you this house will move forward and will continue to make you all very proud!
